The star-spangled banner shall wave triumphantly O'er the land of the free and the home of the brave! A question arises: what do we gain or lose by invoking God's name in battle? Is it fitting to invoke God when waging war? Though answers may not be straightforward, they warrant inquiry. We have too readily equated God's covenant with Israel, assuming similar legitimacy for America. In exploring this issue, we find moral focal points applicable across cultures and time, including how we defend ourselves against those who attack us due to our faith. Verses 1-10: The author builds a chiasmic structure into his retelling of events in Esther 9:1-19. Esther before Ahasuerus The painting "Esther before Ahasuerus" depicts a pivotal moment in the biblical story of Esther, who becomes the queen of Persia and saves her people from persecution. The artwork was created by Johannes Staveren around 1613-14 and is now part of The Leiden Collection. According to the catalogue entry, Esther, a Jewish orphan, wins the heart of the Persian king Ahasuerus despite being raised in secret to conceal her Jewish identity. When the anti-Semitic minister Haman is appointed, Esther agrees to reveal her heritage to Ahasuerus and plead for the lives of her people. The painting shows Esther facing Ahasuerus' guards as she prepares to meet him in a bid to change his heart. The work is significant not only for its depiction of Esther but also for its insight into the religious and cultural tensions between Jews and Persians during that period. The story of Esther teaches us two valuable lessons about sin. When sin is allowed to grow unchecked, it leads to a multitude of problems. As the Bible says, "Temptation comes from our own desires, which entice us and drag us away. These desires give birth to sinful actions. And when sin is allowed to grow, it gives birth to death." - James 1:14-15 (NLT) On the other hand, God often uses ordinary people to do extraordinary things. For example, Mordecai, a humble man who had raised Esther as his own daughter after her parents died, played a crucial role in saving the Jewish people from persecution. Similarly, Amos, a shepherd and a prophet, was called by God to warn the Israelites of their sins and to prophesy to them. We can learn from these examples that even the smallest actions can have significant consequences, and that God is able to use anyone to achieve His purposes.
